The School of Humanities and Social Sciences consists of ten departments and fourteen undergraduate degree programs and offers an array of minor programs and the largest share of the College's College Core program. Note that all students need a minimum of 30 units to graduate with a degree from the School of Humanities and Social Sciences; therefore, students should craft course progressions that will ensure that they reach this threshold. Repeated courses only count once toward graduation.

Undeclared in Humanities and Social Sciences

Description of the program: The Undeclared Program in the School of Humanities and Social Sciences is designed for those students who are not ready to declare a major but are interested in one or more programs within HSS, and considering the minor in Social Justice.

Students in the Undeclared Program choose courses that fulfill requirements in the College Core Curriculum as well as courses in areas they are interested in exploring as possible majors. Students must leave the Undeclared Program and declare a major to graduate.

Program Entrance, Retention, and Exit Standards

Every major program at the College has set standards for allowing students to remain in that program, to transfer within the College from one program to another, and to graduate from a program. The following are the standards for the Undeclared in Humanities and Social Sciences Program:

- Students cannot transfer within the College into the Undeclared program
- Students may remain in the Humanities and Social Sciences Undeclared program no longer than the second semester of their sophomore year.
- Undeclared students who are unable to make significant progress toward a major by the end of their sophomore year will become "UNDESIGNATED TRANSITIONAL" students.
- In rare cases students may remain in the Undeclared program beyond the second semester of their sophomore year if they have shown significant progress toward a major or self-designed major.
